Items of Note

Gossip & rumours are the plague of teenage meanness. It negatively affects victims, perpetrators, and bystanders alike. Victims are made to feel ostracized and humiliated. Perpetrators are labelled as rumour-mongers & gossips. Bystanders are misled, drawn in, and made to feel the need to take a side. There is little benefit to this behaviour that often follows people into adulthood.

While it tends to most obviously impact grade 8 girls, it is far from isolated to them. We see early signs of it in primary grades through to adulthood and boys & men regularly engage in this behaviour as well. As a generalization, boys tend to face it head on and move on from it quickly. For girls, it may linger and persist over years. Either way, it can have long lasting effects.

Institutions are not free from it either. I could list half a dozen rumours I've heard about Pioneer just this year. Whether it is targeted at schools, hospitals, businesses, churches, governments, or individuals, gossiping and the rumour mill are active well into adulthood. So we must always be on guard against it in-person and online.

Be a good example for your children by avoiding it yourself and discouraging them from it as well. Like I tell students, believe only what you directly experience yourself. Anything else is hearsay and therefore suspect.
