 - Trustee (Jackie Janes)
 Superintendent's Report
 - 1. Alberta School Boards Association meeting with education Minister Demetrios Nicolaides: On October 12, 2023 the WRSD Board Chair and superintendent of schools attended an ASBA meeting with the Minister of Education and several members of his team. The Minister reviewed key topics in his mandate letter.
 - 2. **ECS Screening & Assessment -** Student Support Facilitators and our therapy team have been working very hard to ensure that PreKindergarten/Kindergarten students are screened for delays in Speech and Language, Regulation and Fine Motor Skills. Currently, we have identified 61 ECS students with mild moderate delays and 40 students with severe delays. We also have identified 7 ECS students who meet the criteria for gifted/talented. Starting in October all Kindergarten Students will be assessed using the Early Years Evaluation Tool (EYE-TA).

Please share this information with any friends and family with children going into Pre-K. If a child is three by September and has delays, they can get into Pre-K early.

Wellness Accountability Report

Last year we had 5.4 family wellness workers in the north and 5.0 in the south, along with 5.0 Family Wellness Assistants in the South.

Mental Health in Schools Pilot Programs Grant: In November 2022, WRSD was awarded a \$917,000 grant over two years to enhance the Division's Mental

Health Program. As a result of this funding WRSD was able to contract three Mental Health Therapists that will spend their time helping schools that currently do not have direct access to AHS Mental Health Services. 4.5 FTE "Connection Coaches" were also hired to work primarily with students as well as develop new, or strengthen established, community partnership. Further we will be able to provide training and professional development in the areas of mental health. Hopefully this program will become a successful template for other divisions.

SIS (Success in School for children and youth in Care)

Success in School for children and youth in care - Provincial Protocol Framework is a joint initiative between Alberta Education and Human Services to support improved school outcomes and high school completion rates for children and youth in provincial government care.

Hope and Dignity Project

The committee raises money to help meet the needs of those students in our schools who struggle to meet basic needs. Hope & Dignity Project; "Providing support to middle school students in the Division with economic challenges"

Support provided to students and staff in 2022-2023

- 1. Two Indigenous Education Specialists were hired to support both staff and students learn more about and better understand:
 - a. Residential Schools, Indigenous Veterans, drumming, trees and medicine, language, values, Indigenous games, the Blanket Exercise, Winter Solstice, Cree Storytelling and Worldview, Indigenous Peoples Atlas, bannock, tacos, traditional foods, creation stories, Métis sash finger weaving, beading, brain architecture racism, stereotypes, bullying, seasons, Round Dance as well as supporting individual students throughout the year.
 - b. Two Elders supported the Indigenous Education Specialists as well as students in the classroom with: storytelling, the importance of the trees, medicines, round dance, drumming and singing are examples of the support they provided.
 - b. All schools took part in various activities on September 30 to help staff and students learn about residential schools and the importance of acknowledging this terrible truth in our history as a means for moving forward in reconciliation. With the additional support of Indigenous Education Specialists, schools were able to offer more activities and support than the previous year. Many schools purchased Survivor Flags to be displayed or hung in their schools.
