STAFF PROFILE

Janet Hymers Grade 8 teacher

I grew up in Winnipeg and I spent all my free time on Lake Manitoba exploring the outdoors; my parents doing their best to raise wild children, they recognized the need to connect us to wilderness and teach us survival skills. It took me a while to find teaching. I worked with the RCMP and the Winnipeg Police Service; I completed a diploma program in Justice and Public Safety, thinking policing was my career path. After working as an EA for three



years, I realised teaching was my actual calling. I graduated from the University of Winnipeg with a BA and BEd, working every summer at a wilderness camp in Minnesota. I taught sailing, became program director, and led overnight canoe trips on Cass Lake and down the Mississippi River.

I moved to Calgary in 2005, where I taught grade one and two for several years, then moved to grade three, four, and finally grade five.

Having summers available, I worked at Heritage Park as a camp coordinator, taught summer school, and worked at MEC. As the years went by, it was harder and harder to escape to the outdoors and I felt the city was closing in on me. After purchasing a camper, which I parked in a campground just outside Rocky for the summers, I revelled in what the area has to offer.

I decided last year to leave Calgary, take a year away from teaching, and make Rocky my permanent home. I love being outside, I love rescuing animals (as a crazy cat lady I have five, and one dog), gardening, yoga, playing ukulele, and reading. I have enjoyed meeting new friends here in Rocky.
